Legal Status of Referees

- Referees used to be recruited and trained by each club, and were used exclusively by the club
- A couple of years ago, a court case made this practice illegal
- · All referees are considered independent contractors
- The training certifies you as a registered certified independent referee with the United States Soccer Federation (USSF)
- Clubs contract with a Referee Assignor to request referees for games
- Referees accept games and receive payment prior to the start of the game
- A referee is free to work any game they are qualified for, for any club, in any state in the USA



How to become a Referee

- All new referees and any referees who don't recertify the previous year need to take the New Referee course (Usually offered in January – March time frame)
- Approximately 8 hours of online work must be done prior to the course date
- On course date, you have about 4 hours of classroom time and 4 hours of gym time
- Seymour will host a class sometime in January or February (pending availability with the school)
- Existing referees must take the Referee Recertification Course (usually offered between October and December)
- Approximately 4 hours online, 2 hours of classroom, and 2 hours of gym time
- To certify as a referee for the year, you must pass an exam with a score of 75%

Referee Courses

- · Plan to spend about \$235 your first year
- . \$60 for the class (includes \$40 registration with USSF)
- · \$100 for uniform
- Recommend the 11 piece starter kit in Yellow & 7 piece starter kit in Green from officialsports.com
- · Buy shirts at least a size larger to grow into
- Always wear a black shirt under the uniform in case you have to change colors
- \$25 for a digital watch with stopwatch can't use phones
- · \$50 for black shoes

1st Year/New Referee cost



- At least \$50
- . \$50 for the class and USSF Registration
- · Additional funds if you need to replace equipment
- I go through 1 2 packs of score sheets a season (\$2 each)
- These aren't needed at U10 and younger where score isn't kept
- If you are serious about being a referee and want to continue for a long time, you should try to get one of each color shirt, possibly in both short and long sleeve

2nd Year + cost



Referee Grades

- Referee/Center referee/head referee the referee in the middle of the field. Responsible for the game and makes all decisions
- Assistant Referee or AR a referee on one touchline that is responsible for offside calls, determine throw-in direction and helping the referee spot fouls
- 4th official used only in high level games, responsible for substitutions, communication with coaches, time and score
- Additional Assistant Referees (AAR) used only in high level games, positioned on the goal line, similar duties to AR, but indicating corner kicks or goal kicks, rather than throw-ins

Referee Positions

- Referees are licensed at different grades, and a grade determines what games you are able to referee
- · Grade 9 Recreational Youth Referee
- · Grade 8 Competitive Youth Referee
- · Grade 7 Amateur Adult Referee
- Grade 6 State Referee
- Grade 5 State Referee
- Grade 4 National Assistant Referee
- Grade 3 National Referee
- · Grade 2 FIFA Assistant Referee
- Grade 1 FIFA Referee

- All youth becoming a referee who are 12 or 13 years old become a Grade 9 referee
- · You can only referee recreational games
- On the date you turn 14, you are automatically upgraded to Grade 8

Grade 9 Referee

- All new referees who are 14 or older and recertifying grade 8 referees
- Grade 8 referees can work competitive or recreational youth soccer

Grade 8 Referee

- · Must be 17 years old
- · Must pass a course and test
- · Must pass a fitness test
- · Must spend at least 1 year as a grade 8 referee
- Must serve as center referee for at least 50 U16 U18 games
- · Must pass a field assessment

Grade 7 Referee

- · Must serve at the next lower grade for at least 1 year
- Must complete 2 assessments as a referee and 1 assessment as an assistant referee
- · Must pass class, exam and fitness test
- Must also pass an assessment each year as part of recertification
- Generally only done if a person is interested in being a professional referee

Grade 6 & 5

- · These are professional referees
- Candidates must be invited by US Soccer or FIFA to the next level
- Grades 4 & 3 referee professional games in the US
- · Grades 2 & 1 also referee international matches

Grades 4-1



Who Can You Ref?

- All U6 & U8 games (note, the East Central soccer district does not use referees for these games)
- · Center & AR all U10 games
- If 12 may additional AR U12 games
- If 13 may additional Center & AR U12 games

Grade 9


- · The same levels as grade 9
- · All competitive games in the East Central soccer district
- You can be an assistant referee on games equal to your age (i.e. a 14 year old can AR a U14 game)
- You can be a center referee on games 1 year below your age (i.e. – a 16 year old can center referee a U15 game)
- The older and more experienced you are will determine games offered to you.
- A 1st year referee is likely to get offered younger games to gain experience, regardless of age
- Adults can work all position of State League games and AR regional league games

Grade 8

- · All the same games as Grade 8
- · All positions on regional league games
- · All positions on adult amateur league games

- The more you work the more you make
- My son, Ryan, started working as a ref when he was 12
- During that first spring, he worked almost every week, plus 2 tournaments
- · He made over \$500
- This fall he has been busier, and not refed as much, and will make about \$400
- The more you are available and the more you accept games, the more you make

What Will You Make?



- You will get an account in the GameOfficials online system
- · You must mark off when you are unavailable
- Assignors will look for referees in a region that are available and offer them games
- If you decline a lot of games, the assignors will be less likely to assign you games

How to Get Games





- You gain a better and more in depth understanding of the laws of the game
- · You become a better player and coach
- · You get paid very well on an hourly basis
- · You get to be around a game you love
- You get to view and understand the game from a different perspective
- · You increase your confidence and leadership
